Estrela Mountain Dog Club (UK) Limit Show 15/05/2022

As a replacement judge I was honoured by the quality and number of entries. I left the show feeling truly excited about the future of the estrela in the UK. A massive thank you to my steward for keeping things running smoothly and most of all thank you to the exhibitors - we had a mix of novice and experienced handlers and everyone was so patient and sporting.

NB: We had some gusty wind which was blowing exhibits tails up/down/sideways so if you are looking at photos, only one dog had a tail that was genuinely carried over the back.

V D/B (2.1)

1 Reid's Milagre Ice Ice Baby BViS 10 year old, reddish gold, long coat bitch presented in lovely condition. Still conveying the impression of being vigorous and hardy. Alert, intelligent expression with dark eye. Muzzle moderately tapered. Topline of muzzle almost straight, with slightly aquiline nose. Ears small, thin and carried rosed. Short loin and correct, gentle rise on the underline. Withers higher than croup, tail well set with correct length and shape. Movement free and easy, giving no hint of her age.



1 Cooper & Ralph's Milagre Skyforce BPiS pinstripe brindle, short coat male. 7 months old and most 'together' of the four brothers. Lovely, intelligent expression, dark eye with correct oval shape, moderate stop midway between nose and correctly defined occiput, skull only slightly domed. Muzzle almost straight and only slightly tapering, parallel to the skull and showing excellent proportions of length to depth and breadth. Lovely rose ears set on correctly. Good length of rib cage. Broad, well-muscled loin. Slightly sloping croup with good length and tail set. Underline very gently rising. Rear pasterns vertical. Moved straight and true in a typical, easy, purposeful jog trot.

2 Reid's Milagre Icon, tiger brindle, short coat male. A bit more stop than 1 but still with excellent planes and proportions of skull and muzzle. Narrower in front than 1, still with good length of rib cage, Ioin and croup. More angulation behind than 1. Epitomising the correct mastiff type but also epitomising gangly, raw boned, youth at the movement, looks like he has quite a bit more growing still to do than his brothers. Showed some promising paces when settled but not as together as 1 at the moment. One I look forward to seeing in future.



Kong Suffing Recipie

Keep your dogs calm, and distracted this weekend by filling those Kongs with yummy treats!

If you don't have a Kong a tennis ball with a hole cut into works too!



MEATY TREAT

Ingredients: A portion of your dog's normal kibble, about a teaspoon of meat paste, a chunk of banana (about an inch thick).

Method: Half fill the Kong with kibble, then add the meat paste. Using the handle of the spoon, mix the meat paste into the kibble. Add some more kibble, packing it in well, and then plug the large opening with the banana.

Food Fact: Banana is a 'prebiotic' food, which means it provides a good nutritional base to feed the dog's friendly gut bacteria and so promote good digestive health.

SAFETY NOTE: Please make sure your dog is supervised when eating these treats. You must also make sure that your dog has no allergies to ingredients listed.

3 Willicombe & McKenzie's Milagre Revolution, pinstripe brindle, short coat male. Another lovely male who moved beautifully. Very similar to 1 but a touch smaller. Showing a little pink in the inner corners of the eyes - hopefully just from growing.



YD/B (2 0)

1 Tychowski's Cossus D'Domus Stella (IMP PRT) red brindle, long coat male, only just 1 year old. Lovely head with broad skull, only slightly domed, developed occiput, parallel planes, moderate stop and correct proportions. Big, black nose and dark amber eyes of correct shape. Lovely thick neck set onto well bladed and laid back shoulders with nice return of fore arm allowing him to stand well over himself. Great spring of rib, short coupled, moderate angulation and tail with fixed hook. Good bone, thick coat. Not moving with the greatest confidence but straight and true, fore and aft. Another one I look forward to seeing mature.

2 Tychowski's Super Number Initiating red gold with extreme black mask and subsequent black shading on chest legs, long coat bitch. Not the length of skull of 1 and diverging planes giving less stop. Short thick neck into good shoulders. Nice breadth and depth of chest, ribbed well back, short coupled with good bone. Well balanced angulation, moving straight and true but a little hesitant.



SBD (2 0)

1 Wilson's Moon River da Ponta da Pinta (IMP PRT) BSCiS pin stripe brindle short coat. Good length of leg, angulation and overall proportions, of mastiff type. Skull broad, long and slightly domed, amber eye. Rose ear set on correctly. Thick neck into powerful looking shoulders - could do with dropping some weight to show to best advantage - ribbed well back with short, broad loin into slightly sloping croup. Moved straight with a free and easy jog trot.



2 Hall's Estjak Riodouro bright gold fawn with black mask and dark eye. Gives an attractive profile with moderate stop, skull equal length to muzzle which is slightly aquiline and rose ears. Good depth of chest and spring of rib. Good bone. Moved freely and with vigour. Scimitar tail of good length.



1 Payne's Rico das Terras d'Cister (IMP PRT) Shaded red fawn with black head and heavy long coat but of correct texture. This boy gets aloof just right. Lovely, long powerful head, broad and masculine but not too deep or heavy. Correct dark amber eye with fantastic expression. Distinctive rose ears set on correctly. Excellent spring of rib, length of rib cage, underline and broad, short loin. Moderate angulation which showed in effortless, straight, balanced jog trot with level topline and head held in line. At the cobbier end of the spectrum but with so many qualities he was a well deserved BIS.

2 Hall's Estjak Riodouro

LB (2.1)

1Tychowski's Thailla (IMP PRT) Fawn long coat with black head and associated shading. Gorgeous, calm, intelligent expression with correct dark amber eye. More aqualine profile with great length of skull and muzzle, head broad and powerful but still feminine and not deep or heavy. Plenty of bone and substance throughout with balanced angulation, naturally stands four square, lovely shoulder with desired return of forearm, moderately deep and broad chest and loin. Great balance which showed in straight, easy jog trot. Fixed hook in tail making it look shorter than it is. BB & BOS.



OB (20)

1 Roberts' Garregddu Agua Red fawn, long coat with black mask extending over the skull. Dark eye, embodying alert today, lovely small, neat rose ears. Good length of rib with correct, gradual rise of the underline and short, strong loin. Well let down hocks, short, almost vertical pasterns, moved straight and true with great purpose, reach and drive. RBB



Can dogs eat Kale?

Yes! Leafy vegetables pack a powerhouse of vitamins, minerals, carotenoids and flavonoids linked to better health, especially brain health. They're also a good source of helpful roughage. Many fall into the cruciferous family, including kale, spinach, chard, mustard greens, beet greens, collards, dandelion greens, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, bok choy and brussels sprouts. Here, we'll kick off with superfood kale.

Kale, one of the most nutrient-dense vegetables. A rich source of vitamins A, B6, C and E as well as folate and manganese, it also provides thiamin, riboflavin, pantothenic acid and several minerals, such as iron, potassium and phosphorus. Additionally, kale is a great source of two main antioxidants, lutein and zeaxanthin, that can potentially protect against cancer!

Many people include kale in their own smoothies. You can do the same for your dogs by whipping up a doggie superfood smoothie using kale, blueberries, banana, yogurt, chia seeds and other fruits/ vegetables. Freeze in silicone ice cube trays to make refreshing, lickable summer treats, or add a little to a stuffed Kong recipe, then freeze the Kong. Or, use a couple of spoonsful of this smoothie mix as a meal-topper.



2 Edwards' Nabica da Casa da Thuya (IMP PRT) Pale fawn long coat with black mask. Lovely balanced head and expression, amber eye, only wanted to carry one of her ears rosed. Gentle rise to the underline and well let down hocks. Hook in tail.

Rescue Spotlight: Luna

Luna is a 5 year old female from Portugal. Sadly Luna is in conflict with the other female dog in the family since both girls had phantom pregnancies. She has been spayed but sadly the friendship could not be rekindled and the situation is unsafe for both girls so her family have made the heartbreaking decision to rehome Luna.



Luna is OK with other dogs outside of the

household and enjoys her walks. She's fine with people, she can be wary at first which is normal for the breed, but soon warms to new people. She's very attached to her female owner so may do best with a woman in the home. She's always lived in quite a rural area so she may not suit a very urbanised area.

Luna needs to be the only dog in the home. She is not cat tested. She is currently still with her family in Norfolk.

Rescue Spotlight: Loba

Loba is a spayed, 3-year-old female born in the UK and currently living in Cheshire. Her owners describe her as the most loving / loyal companion, however sadly a change in home circumstances has meant her owners have had to take the heart-breaking decision to rehome her.

Like many Estrela's she can be a little timid towards people she first meets but is then the most wonderful, friendly dog! She's brilliant at home and may bark if she's the only dog left alone at home. She's used to having another male dog as company. She's met children but never lived with them, and hasn't been introduced to cats.

Loba will need a secure garden. Like many Estrela's she has poor recall if she sees anything stimulating, so is only allowed off-lead in secure hired areas.

She has played with numerous dogs off lead in a secure field when introduced correctly but is reactive to other dogs when on a lead. She's responsive to treats / training to keep her attention, but the new owner will need to be aware of and manage this. She can also be reactive to other stimulants such as cats etc, but again she's responsive to training and manageable. When calm, she walks perfectly on a lead and doesn't pull, knowing all basic commands well.





Healthwise, she has shown some allergies towards foods and can itch at various times of the year. She's never done this so much that it's caused hair loss etc. and as a precaution her owners have taken preventative action with monthly injections and an allergy diet, so whilst she might benefit from continuing with this, it's also possible that it might not be needed in a new environment. In addition, she has mild hip dysplasia, which was treated with care / physio as a young dog and now requires no treatment at all, however, to maintain this she will need an active home with plenty of

walks to keep her well-muscled.

Sammy was the companion of Soul, who was adopted recently by a wonderful, Estrela orientated family in England. Soul developed fairly quickly into a social, well balanced loving dog. Sammy was his shadow, hiding behind him for support and comfort. Following him around their pen in the shelter but not having the courage to be stroked and cuddled by the volunteers. Now it's Sammy's turn to get a loving home and we will do everything to make that happen. Sammy is shy but very calm and needs someone to help him get over his shyness. Many Estrelas are shy to begin with due to their role as flock guardians working with only a sole shepherd



as their companion. Once you are the one he trusts, his world changes and so does yours.


Sammy is vaccinated, castrated, chipped and tested as all our dogs are.

Ice Cube Fun, Keeping Your Dog Cool

We humans like to escape soaring temperatures by relaxing with a frosty treat – so why should things be any different for our pets? Dogs totally appreciate the cooling effect of frozen tasties when it's super-hot and it's not hard to make yummy healthy cooling snacks for your dog!

Dogs enjoy this yummy treat at all times of year! We've got some recipes for frozen treats your dog will go crazy for. As well as the recipes below you can add your dogs favourite treats, perhaps a small sprat or two.

Watermelon Freezy

All you need is 1 cup watermelon and 1 cup ice cubes. Blend them together until smooth and then pour the mixture into a safe, freezable toy like a KONG or any of the freezable games in the Beyond the Bowl Blog series.

Fruit Slushie

This recipe can also be used as a ready-to-serve slushie. Simply blend it, and then put it in a bowl or in a KONG to have an immediate thirst quencher for your hound. You can also substitute the watermelon for blueberries or bananas if your dog prefers those instead. Feel free to enjoy this yourself, though you may want to add some sugar to your half if you like things a bit sweeter.

Frozen Peanut Butter Banana Pops

A fantastic recipe from Petplan, this one needs: Three 6-oz. containers of plain, low-fat yogurt, ½ cup of low-sodium peanut butter, one 4-oz. jar of banana baby food (or a small ripe banana), and 1 tablespoon of honey. Blend all ingredients well and pour into small paper cups. Put a dog bone in each one to act as a handle. Freeze and then peel away cup to serve!

Breath Garnishes

Why not cool your pup down while helping dispel doggy breath? Fill ice cube tray ¾ of the way with water. Mix a few peppermint leaves or a couple drops of pure peppermint oil with a sprig of parsley and add to each cube. Freeze. Put a few cubes in your dog's water.

When it's really warm, a simple way to cool your dog off (and keep him occupied!) is to just feed him his biscuits frozen. Soak in just enough water (or low-sodium broth!) to cover about half the biscuits. When the biscuits have absorbed most the water, stuff into a KONG or other freezable treat toy.

It's Tick Season!

Tick season is from March to November. We have had such a wet winter that it is likely conditions will be very favourable for ticks once the weather starts to warms up. It is very difficult to limit the spread of tick borne disease due to the prevalence of wildlife (hedgehogs, foxes, deer, badgers, birds and small rodents) that will be out in places where we like to walk our dogs.


The tick risk, can start in our own back garden where hedgehogs and foxes may come through. The tick cannot jump like a flea but it will crawl up long blades of grass and catch a ride by grabbing out with its front legs to a passing body.

Ticks tend to thrive in damp and marshy areas and so dogs who love water may be more likely to come into contact with them.

Generally ticks will attach to areas of the body with exposed skin and less hair where there are rich blood vessels close to the surface. Abdomen, armpits, ears, around the eyes, groin and between the toes are good places to check when back from a dog walk.

Even if a dog is on treatment for tick prevention nothing will be 100% effective.

Dogs and Adders - Keeping Safe



It's summer and in some areas such as heathland and open forest there are adders around which can give dogs a nasty bite.

Have you ever been told not to walk your dog in hot weather when adders are around? The flawed logic behind that advice could actually end up increasing your chances of an adder encounter. Here's why...

Beware of cool adders

A hot adder is alert and fast. It will readily detect approaching footsteps and slither away from danger. A cool adder is dopey and sluggish. It can easily be caught off-guard and, unable to escape quickly, will be forced to defend itself.

So cool adders are the ones you really ought to avoid. Those who understand reptiles recognise the best times and conditions in which to find cool adders. By cool adders we mean those warm enough to have come out of their underground shelters but too cold to be very active. In that state they bask to soak up the sun's warmth, giving you a good chance to spot them.

Watch the temperature

There is little point in looking for adders when the temperature is much below 10°C or much above 17°C. If it's very cold, or dark, or raining heavily, the snakes will not venture out. If it's hot, they will have little need to bask and they will be too quick to see.

There are no guarantees, but if you stick to walking when it's colder than 10°C or warmer than 17°C, and ideally allow for an extra margin of error on those figures, you will be a lot less likely to meet an adder.

Where are we likely to come across adders?

The classic adder habitats are heathlands, grasslands and other natural-looking grassy areas such as the edges of beaches. You may have walked your dog amongst an adder population without even knowing it, areas such as The New Forest are something of a stronghold for this declining and protected species.

Shift with the seasons and the weather

The time of day when reptile lovers are out looking for adders is in that 10°C to 17°C window.

You might well find adders basking in October, November, March and occasionally in even colder months. In spring and autumn, adders typically venture out between about 9 and 11 in the morning and 4 and 7 in the afternoon to give them the best chance of basking. That means you are relatively 'safe'

walking before 9 am or after 7 pm - unless the weather is unusually warm for the season, in which case you need to go earlier in the morning or later in the evening.

In summer you have to get up very early in the morning if you want to walk before the adders wake. If the weather stays warm, they may still be moving around and basking well into the evening. The safest option, other than walking somewhere else, might be to go for a walk when it's hot.

There are other complicating factors which make it impossible to give a precise definition of what is a bad time to walk your dog (or a good time to look for reptiles). For example, overcast weather with hazy sunshine filtering through the clouds can bring adders out basking at any time of day. Sunny periods between showers have a similar effect.

How serious is an adder bite?

To put things into perspective, many people in Britain have been bitten by adders - often because they pick them up - but the last death was in 1975. That's over 40 years ago. Figures for dog casualties are hard to come by, but it does seem that most survive the experience - albeit with major illness and injury in some cases.

In the event of a bite, get to the hospital or vet, respectively, as quickly as possible but don't panic. Try to slow down the spread of the venom by preventing running, over-excitement or movement of the affected area. Ideally, children and dogs should be carried.

To summarise

You can minimise the risk of stumbling upon a dozy, defensive adder by walking in areas where they are most likely to be found when it's very cold, very hot or raining heavily. You can also walk in the dark, of course, as basking requires at least some sunlight.

However some people are afraid of adders, they have much more to fear from us and they will abandon an area if they are disturbed too much. Staying away - or keeping your dog on a lead - at the times when they are most vulnerable is good for your dog's safety and for wildlife conservation.


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


